A letter from Dan Spanton new Waterloo board member.

I want to say hello to everyone and welcome you all to the new year. As many of you are aware, I am one of several new board members for the 2023 year and I would like to thank everyone for your warm acceptance. I also want to take the time to acknowledge those of you who really wanted to be on the board, but due to the fact that Carol Sue Wit wasn't as convincing to you as she was to me, somehow left you all off the hook.

Now that we are acquainted, I would like to jump right in with a little information about myself. Book Worms—**Eileen Pestorius**

Bookworms will explore two more artists before summer break. First is Leonora Carrington, a beautiful adventurous Surrealist who later became famous in Mexico. She left her family to enter an emotional Paris liaison with Max Ernst, a sophisticated older artist with whom she met Picasso, Duchamp, Miro and others before fleeing to New York amid chaos and terror created by Nazis. Ernst was German—and also married. Max Ernst was not Jewish. (He was born Catholic.) The mother of his son was Jewish. He was in danger from the Nazis because of his "degenerate" art.

This long-maned English debutante faced love and adventure; besides painting, she wrote fiction and plays. Readers may choose fiction or biography: The Surreal Life of Leonora Carrington by Joanna Moorehead is biography that reads almost like fiction, or Leonora by Elena Poniatowska, a leading Mexican writer, is a novel.

We will meet at Eileen Pestorius' home Saturday at 9:30 on Valentine's weekend, February 11, 2023, the new year. Discussion starts at 10 and every WWG

member is welcome, but it's always nicer if you've read the book!

The May discussion will be on Kehinde Wiley, well known even before he painted the Barak Obama portrait; the Blanton owns a piece by him too. In DC, Obama's portrait immediately doubled visitor turnout at the Portrait Gallery and looks very different from other presidential portraits, since it's covered with flowers representing places in Obama's life. Part of the discussion will be focused on The Obama Portraits by Caragol, Moss, and Powell. Amy Sherald painted Michelle Obama's portrait and is included in this book. Another book about Wiley that some might like to read is Kehinde Wiley: A New Republic by Connie Choi.

Many presidents are nearby, from a full length George Washington painted by Gilbert Stuart to a modern day Trump photo. My favorite is Chuck Close's huge Clinton portrait, which up close is a wild kaleidoscope of vivid paint colors, but from afar, a smiling face emerges. Closes's disease prevented him from seeing an entire face so he divided it up.

Eligibility Requirements

- Open to all current members of Waterloo Watercolor Group. Go to: waterloowatercolor to join.
- · No fee to enter.
- Entries must be original and not copied from another artist's work, photographs, or publications.
- Work may not be based on or directly derived from

reference materials created or arranged by others, even if with permission, royalty-free or not copyrighted.

• All accepted work must remain at Georgetown Library for the duration of the exhibition.

Media and Substrates

- Watercolor, gouache, acrylics, egg tempera and casein paints as well as watercolor pencils, crayons and water soluble inks are accepted.
- Mediums, gels, gesso and other painting supplements may be used. Pastels, gold and silver leaf are acceptable as long as water-based medium is dominant. No water-based oils.
- Collage is acceptable using hand-painted white papers painted with water-based media.
- Acceptable papers/supports include cotton rag, oriental papers, synthetic paper (Yupo), watercolor canvas and any kind of coated paper or board. Waxed watercolors accepted.
- Presentation is important. If mats are used, work should be glazed with acrylic, no glass.
- D hooks preferred but screw eyes accepted on narrow frames. No saw tooth hangers.
- Label paintings on the back with name of artist, title, price and contact information.

The deadline for artist submissions is January 13, 2023, and invited entries must be received at the WAS-H gallery by 3:00 p.m. CST, on February 28, 2023, to be included in the exhibition.

The 46th International Watermedia Exhibition will showcase paintings by global participants from March 5 – March 30, 2023, at the WAS-H Gallery in Houston's Museum District and winners will be awarded over \$10,000 in prizes.

Acclaimed watercolor artist, Brenda Swenson, WW, NWWS, SDWS, CWA, will serve as the juror and judge for the event. Swenson's art has been featured in several volumes of "Splash: Best of Watercolor", "Watercolor Artist", "Watercolor Magazine", "Watercolor Highlights", "Plein Air Magazine" and numerous other publications.
