Waterloo Message — The art of the critique

One of the ways we learn is by having others observe our paintings and give us some feedback. For the most part, our fellow artists are kind: you did this well and you could use a little change in that area. To be clear, the word critique does not mean to criticize, even though the two words sound close. A critique has four parts: describe, analyze, interpret, and evaluate.

In my Tuesday painting group at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church, most of us (about a dozen artists) walk around the room and see what others are painting. No one provides comments unless asked by the artist. In the Monday 620 group, they have a critique session at noon while they eat brought lunches, and anyone who wants comments or help with their paintings can put their art against the wall.

Critiques such as these are immensely helpful. Other artists can often see what needs to be done to a painting. Sometimes just a little change will make the center of interest pop or fix a troubled area. Most workshops include a critique session in which the instructor provides helpful comments to students in the class about their work.

Janet Fulk came up with a "game" in which art can be critiqued by fellow artists. Every artist who participates puts a painting backwards against the wall. She puts a number on the painting. Then members of the group pick a number and pick up the painting that corresponds. The member can comment on the painting and then let others in the group provide comments. The key word in these exercises is to be kind.

As artists, we often know when we have a good painting or one that just doesn't work. Sometimes comments by other artists can allow you to turn a mediocre painting into a good one. By painting with others, joining an art group, or going to a workshop, you too become a critique of art—your own and others—and you learn the value of those critiques.

The Importance of Painting by Sara Jane Parsons



My life stretched before me like a long, dark tunnel after becoming quadriplegic in a car accident. I had no idea where I was going or what I was doing. Then I discovered I could draw and paint, and a whole new brighter, lighter world opened up for me. Drawing and painting gave me new life.

Prior to becoming quadriplegic, I was a very physically active person. I swam competitively starting at age 5. When my family moved to Minnesota I took to downhill and cross-country skiing in the winters, and canoeing and windsurfing in the summers. I would run and ride my bike all year round. I exercised daily with the idea that if I did sit-ups and push-ups everyday, I should be able to do them for the rest of my life. Becoming paralyzed from the shoulders down made me frustrated, angry, and depressed. My junior high art teacher took me to a one-day watercolor class, and while the class was somewhat disappointing to us both, I was hooked.

Painting became my new sport.
Suddenly, I had purpose and direction. Here was something I had never really done before becoming disabled, and I just wanted to get "good at it." If I wasn't drawing or painting, I was dreaming about it. An attendant with a degree in fine arts encouraged me to take a figure drawing class, and I fell in love. I was attending 2 to 3 figure drawing sessions a week. And continued on page 3

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when I wasn't at a session, I was painting at home using seashells for models.

Initially, I chose to use watercolor as my primary medium because it is so readily available and I love it. It doesn't matter if my paint dries up, as I can easily bring it back to life. The simplicity of it is so attractive, especially in contrast to my daily life, which can be so logistical and complicated. I am set and ready to go with just water, pigment, and paper.

Now, however, I am swimming in completely uncharted waters, and learning to paint with oils. I've been working with artist/mentor, Frank Eber. Painting with oils is so completely different from painting with watercolor, it is helpful to have his enthusiasm and guidance as I navigate this new process, which is proving to

be both challenging and exciting. I feel I am just scratching the surface of what I will be able to do with this medium.

Becoming a part of the The Association of Mouth and Foot Painting Artists as a mouth painter changed my life again. Not only is it an honor and incredible opportunity to be a part of an international association of artists, but I have the support needed to pursue my love of making art.

Painting is something I never knew I could do prior to becoming disabled. It challenges me. It fills me with ambition and purpose. It leads to new friends and connections. It constantly opens me up to new worlds and new experiences, and above all, brings me joy. I will forever be working on getting good at it.


So the bottom line is that we will no longer accept checks for payment. You can use our website to sign up for all sorts of activities



We'll discuss topical modern artists Kehinde Wiley and Amy Sherald, famous for their Obama portaits, but also many others. Suggestions? Read *The* Obama Portraits by Taina Caragol, Dorothy Moss, and Richard Powell. Another book is Kehinde Wiley: A New Republic. These books are available at reasonable prices, particularly on Kindle, or try the public library; other information is online. Our Austin Blanton owns one large colorful Wiley. Visitations to the Washington DC Portrait Gallery doubled after the Obama paintings were shown but every president is on display in the refurbished Patent Office, from Gilbert Stuart's George Washington on. For best results, run off to Washington before the discussion! As ever, all are welcome; we meet quarterly for delightful and informative discussions, but first we chat with friends and nibble, then delve into the books.

September: This fall we will focus on a pair of related books which might spice up your summer reading. One is Hugh Eakin's Picasso's War: How Modern Art Came to America, which discusses how the controversial leader of the Paris avant-garde broke through to the heart of American culture; the book includes the first and second world wars and many other painters we know.
