
In Memoriam—Rosemary Thompson

"Do you want the truth?" was just one of the comments Rosie might say if you asked her opinion on your painting. Mostly, it was "you need more darks" or "why don't you move this building over here?" She also doled out plenty of compliments to fellow artists on Tuesday mornings at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church.

Rosemary Keir Thompson died on July 1, 2023 just days before her 95th birthday. She died at home in her sleep, just the way she wanted. She had cared for her husband Luther of 71 years for several years before his death at home two years ago. They had three children: Michael, Victoria Anne, and Melanie. They also developed deep friendships with Randy Bryza and Janie Barth who they regarded as a son and daughter #3. Rosie was born in Dallas and graduated from the University of Texas with a degree in Applied Art. She loved art and was truly passionate about it.

She joined Waterloo Watercolor Group early in the club's development (sometime in the 1980s) and instigated a series of workshops for club members, some as long as two weeks. She followed nationally recognized artists and attended their workshops in various parts of the country. She rightfully earned the name, "the workshop queen." She was an honorary member of WWG for many years. She won prizes for her beautiful work and was a signature member of Texas Watercolor Society. She was a





member of Art Among Friends for many years at St. Matthews Episcopal Church where she painted regularly on Tuesdays with other artists, most of whom wanted her advice and encouragement.

Her watercolor paintings are easily recognized by their vibrant colors, beautiful florals, and

luminous landscapes. Later paintings showed quirky abstract patterns, and bold personalities. Rosie never gave up painting and had three abstract paintings in a spring show at St. Matthews. She will be fondly remembered for her advice, passion and inspiration to other artists.

She also was librarian and made copies of all WWG's VHS educational watercolor instructional video tapes so there would always be a quality tape in case some were ruined with use. She ALWAYS videotaped ALL the demos as well!!

Bookworms—Eileen Pestorius


After a lengthy summer reading hiatus, we will meet on September 30th at Eileen Pestorius' home. Come on Saturday at 9:30 for refreshments and chatting, 10 for discussing two exceptional books about modern art.

Jack Flam's Matisse and Picasso beautifully and gracefully explores their rivalry and friendship. Picasso, a young dramatic little Spaniard, was a Surrealist darling who worked in a dilapidated Montmartre building with no gas or electricity and a few junk shop furnishings. He often painted from memory, later explored Cubism, skewed human anatomy, never quite mastered French, and became the most famous painter of the 20th century. Matisse was fourteen years older, a loner, married father of three; a native Frenchman, he painted in an immaculate studio from the model. He went to law school but chose to paint, becoming a Fauve—a wild beast, critics said, for his audacious use of color—and showed at the Salons. His determined departure from tradition caused audiences to laugh. Both struggling artists sold to Americans, Gertrude


and Leo Stein, in Paris as traditional ideas of beauty gave way to aggressive ugliness. New ways explored reality. The book follows their lives as they noticed each other, grew famous, and often competed.

Picasso's War, How Modern Art Came to America, by Hugh Eakins, explores the same period but is focused on not only Picasso but many others who came to our shores largely because of the upsidedown world caused by world war. John Quinn was a Wall Street lawyer who set out to acquire a Picasso collection in the '20's. He met Alfred Barr, the very young new director of MOMA who shared his enthusiasm for modern art even as critics guffawed. Paris and New York scenes, lawyers, Nazis, u-boats, and artists of every ilk are included in this book as slowly the Old World art leaders and their work perilously came to the New.

Both books are highly recommended and well written. All members are welcome, and encouraged to have finished at least one of the books. Happy reading!
