Martha did sketches while on her cruise to Alaska in August. She has graciously allowed us to include her work in this issue of the newsletter. The sketches are expressive, whimsical and inspirational. It's a wonderful reminder that dedicating time to just sketching where we are, in the moment, can produce marvelous results.

If you've never painted as you travel, I highly recommend learning to be comfortable doing this. It can bring you such joy, making our travel experiences even more memorable, plus it can help you to learn better to observe and draw. All it takes is practice with DOINGI At first one can feel uncomfortable, afraid of people seeing you, but once you get into the drawing, you don't notice! And people don't often bother to talk to me, or some ask if they can see, and are enthralled and so nice!

As I traveled on this cruise, I read **Danny Gregory's book**An Illustrated Journey: Inspiration from the Private Art
Journals of Traveling Artists, Illustrators and Designers
that Wendy Holmgren recommended. (See photo on next

page.) I was able to download it for FREE with my Amazon Prime Unlimited ebook account, but it can be purchased for \$21.10 hard-cover or \$18.99 as a Kindle ebook. What a great read — 43 artists listing their supplies and how they sketch as they travel!

At left are my supplies I keep in the small zippered tote: small sizes of cut watercolor paper (140# Arches), a 6" x 9" spiral bound water-color sketchbook, a small plastic palette (I emptied the junky water-color and squeezed in my own). A small film container full of water and a round brush with water in the handle (TSA has NEVER discovered these!), the 3 travel brushes that Carol Sue Witt recommended to us (Amazon Travel Fuumuui Geniune Squirrel Hair Pocket Size \$16.99), Sharpie fine & fat markers, Staedtler pigment liner 0.7, Sanford Pink Pearl eraser in pencil form, Ebony graphite pencil, small sharpener, and business cards!

Above, right: I always easily carry in my small purse just the small palette, cut paper sheets, fine Sharpie and pigment liner, and water handle brush. But lately, I'm using my smart phone with a stylus and the *Sketchbook* app more for quickles and ease.



Bookworms—Eileen Pestorius

After a lengthy summer reading hiatus, we will meet on September 30th at Eileen Pestorius' home. Come on Saturday at 9:30 for refreshments and chatting, 10 for discussing two exceptional books about modern art.

Jack Flam's *Matisse and Picasso* beautifully and gracefully explores their rivalry and friendship. Picasso, a young dramatic little Spaniard, was a Surrealist darling who worked in a dilapidated Montmartre building with no gas or electricity and a few junk shop furnishings. He often painted from memory, later explored Cubism, skewed human anatomy, never quite mastered French, and became the most famous painter of the 20th century. Matisse was fourteen years older, a loner, married father of three; a native Frenchman, he painted in

an immaculate studio from the model. He went to law school but chose to paint, becoming a Fauve—a wild beast, critics said, for his audacious use of color—and showed at the Salons. His determined departure from tradition caused audiences to laugh. Both struggling artists sold to Americans, Gertrude and Leo Stein, in Paris as traditional ideas of beauty gave way to aggressive ugliness. New ways explored reality. The book follows their lives as they noticed each other, grew famous, and often competed.

Picasso's War, How Modern Art Came to America, by Hugh Eakins, explores the same period but is focused on not only Picasso but many others who came to our shores largely because of the upside-



I also cut up a number of my old purged paintings to make table tent name tags (about 5x7) for each participant ahead of time and send my newsletter to each participant. My newsletters always include timely painting tips and new work each month.

One-Day Workshops—Sue Kemp





He met Alfred Barr, the very young new director of MOMA who shared his enthusiasm for modern art even as critics guffawed. Paris and New York scenes, lawyers, Nazis, u-boats, and artists of every ilk are included in this book as slowly the Old World art leaders and their work perilously came to the New.

Both books are highly recommended and well written. All members are welcome, and encouraged to have finished at least one of the books. Happy reading!
