April was a busy month for WWG.
Nineteen members participated in
Art at the Bend on the campus of
Riverbend Church. The weather was
perfect. The volunteers at Riverbend
responsible for the show are to be
commended, among them our own
Carol Sue Witt. They managed a large
event with over 100 artists beautifully.

Our Spring Juried Show, with 51 paintings, is hanging at North Hills Gallery until May 25. The juror, Ric Dentinger, provided a successful, informative workshop for all participants. Thank you to **Helen Green**, show chair, for managing the juried show. Thank you, also, to **Kathleen Stafford** and **Lonnie Swanson** for their efforts in planning and executing another fantastic educational opportunity for our members.

May will be an exciting month also. We will be moving the Spring Show from North Hills Gallery on May 25 to the Gallery at Canopy for a two-week exhibit. The reception will be held on Saturday, June 1, from 1–4 pm at the Gallery. The location is 916 Springdale Rd., Austin, 78702. This will be our first

alliance with Capital Art Society in a joint show. Our groups are the oldest visual arts groups in Austin supporting oil and water media artists (CAS, 1965 & WWG, 1977).

The Canopy is a facility in east Austin housing artists' studios, a coffee shop/restaurant and ample parking. This show represents our attempt to explore new and different venues to promote WWG and our fine array of artist members.

Activities usually slow down for the summer, but keep painting. We have our Fall Juried Show in September. In addition, there will be two opportunities for members to submit their art in October–December timeframe. We have been asked to exhibit at Texas State and at the gallery at St. David's North. Members will be able to exhibit multiple paintings at Texas State. St. David's will be limited to 30 paintings, so first come, first serve!

JUDGE'S COMMENTS: Ric Dentinger



FIRST PLACE: *Market Fruit Sellers* by Martha Paisley Ruth

The values are fantastic in this painting. The darks and lights are strong, particularly the light behind the man. Confidence comes through. The artist knows where she is going with the colors and brushstrokes and knows where to take the viewer's attention. The storytelling is good.

THIRD PLACE: East of the Pecos by Dan Spanton






SECOND PLACE: *Listening* by Kathleen Stafford

There is a confident hand in the brushstrokes. I love the lost and found edges and the expression. The color palette, subtleties, shape, and composition are strong, particularly with the finger pointing down.

The timing in this painting is fantastic. The artist knew when to put water down and when to stop. He knew the right pigment load for the water load, which is a difficult balance. He knew when to go in, whether when wet or dry. I like the use of splatter breaking up some areas. The painting is not overworked. There is good storytelling and mood with the inclusion of the longhorns. They are subtle and almost subliminal, just enough, not too literal. The painting shows a confident hand.

MERIT AWARDS (These are listed alphabetically by artist, not ranked.)



Christine Gilbert, Mirror and the_ Protective Eye: I like the use of gold leaf. The geometric forms in the background are good, and these designs add more interest to the portrait.




Helen Green, *Over My Shoulder*: I like the modern portraiture look, with the person looking over her shoulder. This painting has a good design element with the portrait. The artist captures the attitude in the face.



Yingying Chen, Sunrise at Grand Canyon: I like this painting! The artist captured the glow of the canyon walls beautifully. There is also nice subtlety in the rock formations.

Mirror: I like the subtlety of the colors running together and the very subtle change in values. There are lots of colors in the blue. There is good use of pen and ink, and the style is not fussy. The painting tells a story, and the partial face in the foreground is cleverly done.





Sue Kemp, *Tranquility:* This painting does a good job of bringing the fall trees forward, and it is able to give some sense of distance going back.



Bookworms—Eileen Pestorius

Bookworms had a great discussion on April 20 about Isabella Stewart Gardner, her collection, and her museum. We read a variety of books including the recent novel *The Lioness of Boston* and the brandnew biography *Chasing Beauty*.

In the fall, our first meeting will be held on September 14 at 9:30 am at the home of Eileen Pestorius. We will read *The Vanishing Man: In Pursuit of Velazquez* by Laura Cumming and/or any other work about Velazquez. Cumming's book is about an English bookseller who bought a portrait of a prince (later Charles I) at an auction. He believed it was a portrait by Velazquez and spent much time, energy, and money trying to prove that. The book combines the story of the bookseller with some biographical

information about the artist, about whom relatively little is known.

For those of you who read e-books, Amazon has one for the great price of \$2.99: The Complete Works of Diego Velazquez in the Delphi Classics series about artists. As with some other books about Velazquez, it is short on biography (about 30-40 pages at the end of the book), but it is long on reproductions of the works, including 143 works, with separate commentary (and additional enlarged photos of details) about the most celebrated nineteen. It gives a good overview of his works, and some interesting context for his life, with much criticism of the court in which he had to live.


