Wet Paint The Waterloo Watercolor Group Newsletter

That partially finished painting

There is a point in many paintings where you ask yourself if you really want to continue to spend the time and effort to complete it. It happens to me often.

Ask yourself:

- Why am I painting this? Is it for a certain purpose such as a gift or a calendar?
- •Does it convey the message I want?
- •Is the perspective right?
- •Have I already ruined it with too many darks?
- •Is it beyond repair?
- •Do I like the subject and want to continue?

Most partially finished paintings can become excellent paintings with a little work. Sometimes you think a painting is finished, but later discover it needed more work, more color, more value (usually some darks to make things stand out) and often just a few changes.

I think most watercolor paintings go through that in-between stage. Many artists plan for this starting with lights and working toward establishing the subject as they go. I get started on a painting and work intently until I realize I need to stop. The colors are bleeding where I don't want them and I need to rethink certain areas. When that happens, I leave that painting for an hour, a day, or longer. When I go back to the dry painting, I can continue with renewed enthusiasm toward making it a better painting. I may do this several times.

One note is that watercolor artists often don't let their paintings dry long enough and I admit that is a fault of mine. That is truly a secret that good watercolorists know. Letting the painting dry gives you a new surface to work on and also gives you time to review your work. Look at what you have done so far. Often you'll see areas that need improvement and areas that are just right.

Look at some paintings you did last year or longer ago. I bet you would now consider some of them "partially finished." Put one of them on your easel or table and add a few touches—some darks here and there, some splashes, maybe even some white gouache. It's fun to do this and will remind you how far you've come as an artist.
