#### **Clean Your Watercolor Palette**

When you are ready to paint, do you spray water on the dry, hard plops of watercolor paints in your palette? Some paints are almost gone. Others have a big hole with paint now only around the edges. Still others have bled into nearby paints wells. It's messy. How long has it been since you've started with fresh paint? Furthermore, what are the colors in those almost empty wells?

Palette care is important for watercolor artists. Did you make a chart showing all the colors in your palette and listing the names of those colors and maker? This is important. When you need to replenish some colors, you need to know which yellows go in which of the three or four wells of yellow paints. Lemon yellow, yellow ochre, hansa yellow, Naples yellow, etc. And by which manufacturer: Daniel Smith, Windsor Newton, Lukas, M. Graham, Turner, etc. While many of the same names for paint colors are used by these makers, the colors are often not quite the same.

Recently I cleaned my main palette, the one I use at home. It took a couple of hours. First, I removed all the old paint. I had to dig some of it out of the wells and had to wash some of it out. I then planned which paints would go in the little wells, row by row.

My Mijello Fusion Airtight palette has 33 wells, which allow me to have several of each color family plus some special colors. Most palettes have a good



number of wells. When you make your chart, make it look like your palette.

I planned my new colors row by row. With each tube, I pressed a good amount of paint out and cleaned the top of the tube and lid so that the paint in the tube would remain fresh. I then put the tubes in a plastic box to keep with the palette. As I went through each row, I put a dab of color for each well onto the watercolor chart that was close to the same size as the palette. Then I listed the color and maker (e.g., Scarlet Lake, WN). This takes time, but is worth it as you go forward. When you need to add to or replace paints, you know exactly which colors to use.

Some artists don't want to take the time and instead just buy a new pristine palette. Even if you do that, make a chart and list the colors and maker and keep those tubes in a convenient place for replenishing or replacing paint in your palette. Your art will improve with your attention to your palette paints and you will feel more confident.


#### In Memoriam

The art book club Bookworms is open to all members of WWG. Our next meeting will be held on Saturday, May 3, at 9:30 am. We will be discussing Hayden Herrera's biography *Frida: A Biography of Frida Kahlo.* As always, it is OK to read a different book about Frida—or, in this case, to read one about Diego Rivera since their

lives are so intertwined. There is also an excellent documentary on Amazon Prime entitled *Frida*; it is highly recommend both for its substance and its artistry in presentation.

We had a lively discussion in February of Sebastian Smee's book *The Art of Rivalry*.
