Michael's Episcopal Church on Capital of Texas Highway. I hope many of you can attend. Ken Call's workshop, taking place October 13–15, has been sold out for weeks. This will be a great opportunity to see Ken's approach to watercolor portraits in person.

For the past several years WWG has been using <u>onlinejuriedshows.com</u> to manage our entries and are continuing to use them.

Please know that they are very helpful if anyone has difficulty with the process and the show chairs can also help.



When is your painting finished?

This is one of the questions all artists have about their paintings. Sometimes you get to a place where it needs a touch here and there. How many "touches"? When to stop? Sometimes you've even gone too far and overworked the thing. We've all been there.

I say to every painting, let it cook. By that I mean, put it on your easel or wall and just look at it for a few days. There is no better judge than you, the artist, about your own work. In fact, most of us are way too critical about our own paintings. Sometimes we're in a painting group with friends who can offer positive critiques and that can help resolve your issues.

Here are a few things to look for:

• Values. Does the main attraction in the painting stand out? Sometimes a little touch of dark paint will cause the whole painting to come alive! The contrast between your lightest area and darkest cause the viewer to see that first.

- **Proportion**. Are the shapes right for the general painting? People should be at the same general size. Doors and windows of buildings should not be too big or small for that building.
- **Light Source.** Where is the light coming from? Do your shadows tell the story? Do you need to illuminate some areas a little more or darken them?
- **Perspective**. If the building is going into the distance, are the windows and doors also slanted in the same way? Is the road, path or walk narrowing as it goes away?
- Main focus. Is the main focus of your painting too near the edge? It should not be within two inches of any edge of your painting.

Just remember that every painting is a little lesson. We learn from every one of our paintings what is good and what could be improved upon. As we look at our paintings on the wall, we can usually say "I really liked this, but this other area could have been continued on page 4

different (brighter, bigger, smaller, etc.)." Don't be discouraged by these problem areas; be inspired, because now you know how to control that issue.

I believe that most paintings take on a life of their own. Even when I've worked from a photo or scene or picture online, the scene changes when I add my colors and values. Sometimes this is on purpose, but often it just happens. As Jean Haines says, "I love watching a painting develop before my eyes. Sometimes the process is quick, sometimes it is slow. But I allow my work to evolve at its own pace."

So, when is your painting finished? Charles Reid says, "For me I'm finished when I can't think of anything more to do. I usually get a wave of weariness with a

picture and then I know it's time to stop." You, your own critic, will find that this feeling of being finished comes more easily the more you paint. Did you say what you wanted to say? And when you say YES to that feeling, sign your painting and appreciate the work and lessons learned from it.

To all my friends in Waterloo Watercolor Group, this is a Final Finish for me after years of doing monthly columns. I'm moving to New Braunfels in a few weeks near family. I have loved my time in WWG and have learned so much.


WWG members, **Eddie Sutherland** and **Helen Green**are having a joint exhibit at North
